"The rate increase predictions combined with the fact that people are more conscientious has created a greater sense of urgency," Craig said. Other factors which Craig feels are significant include an increased awareness of energy issues, and also the public is assuming a more proactive, "be prepared" stance when faced with the rising energy costs.
